MEDINAH COUNTRY CLUB COURSE #2 RESTORATION

Summary

Medinah Country Club is blessed with three unique golf courses which provide the membership an opportunity to play an unrivaled variety and quality of golf. Course #2 is an essential part of this combination and its importance to the club should not be underestimated as it serves the widest range of the membership.

Course #2 is a nearly undisturbed part of the club's history. Tom Bendelow's original design and feature shaping still exists to a high degree on Course #2. Our goal is the preservation and reclamation of these fascinating and historic features while updating the infrastructure to achieve the modern conditioning the membership requires.

Overview

Greens

The green complexes on Course #2 maintain their original contours. The green surfaces themselves have shrunk substantially over the years. Enlarging the surfaces will add a large number of interesting and challenging hole locations that were key parts of the original design.

Bunkers

As with the greens, the bunkers that still exist have lost their shape and original size. These bunkers should be restored to their original, generally smaller, size and shape. There are a number of locations where the locations of strategic original bunkers can be reinstated.

Fairways


The fairways have narrowed significantly over the years, restricting the strategy inherent in the original design. Our goal is to widen the fairways to incorporate the original design intent with the requirements of the modern game.

Tees

The tees should be enlarged and properly constructed to ensure good conditioning and a wide variety of hole lengths. Blue and orange tee levels should be incorporated into the new fairways.

We believe the restored Bendelow design on Course #2 will result in a link to Medinah's legacy that has championship conditioning as well as strategy and playability for members of all abilities.









The fairway is widened to the right to achieve the proper angle on the tee shot. By reclaiming the green's original size and restoring the back left bunker, the intended draw tee shot is favored with a nice opening to the heart of the green. Interesting challenging hole locations will be created on the front and back left of this green.




The green expansion coupled with the removal of the non-original green side bunker will create a new feel on this putting surface. Still sloping back to front, yet new corners come into play. The forward tee addition will make this long par 4 playable for all, and the extend fairway width will make the landing areas more accessible. Restoring the left side fairway bunker and connecting the fairway to hole #7 brings back some original Tom Bendelow features and fairway widths.


The original size of this green will return tremendous amounts of movement back into this putting surface. Restoring the bunkers to their intended size will both emphasize their effect and provide more intended run-up opportunities to the green.



The restored fairway bunkers and expansion of the fairway will bring the intended look, and decision to the tee shot. Club selection and strategy will now be more of a consideration.




The green restoration will expand well into the current approach and be guarded from the left approach by the original cross bunker. The left line of play from the tee is now more challenging with the restoration of the fairway bunker and guarded approach. While the right line of play is inviting, with the approach widening to a larger green, having the bunker to carry off the tee will present a mental challenge.

Par 3



This green is one of most intriguing as it has lost close to 50% of its original size. Long peninsula like wings off of the back left and right, separated by a large mound will bring many new hole locations and putts to all players. Extension and restoration of the green side bunkers on both sides will make hitting the new larger green a premium.



The original back tee has already been replaced, yet adding a new forward tee will expand the playability of this long par 5. The left side fairway bunkers will redefine the line of play, while the reinstated approach bunker will encourage strategic placement of the 2nd shot.




The addition of new tees will bring this hole to a length suitable for varying skill levels. The right green side bunker will be added to complete the original horseshoe, yet modified with break points for access. The front of the green will be lifted slightly and the approach faded more into the fairway, creating more hole locations on the front of the green.

The expansion of the fairway on the left side will provide a safe 3 shot alternative. While the risk reward line of play on the right will be opened up to entice some to go for it. The green will expand, yet its perched nature creates trouble for any approach shot that isn't directly on the surface.


An added back tee will bring the newly reinstated fairway bunker on the left into play from all tee locations. The fairway bunker and the fairway expansion on the left will make the hole play as it was originally intended. The green expansion is also quite large with unique and interesting shelves and false fronts coming into play.


Reinstating the left fairway bunker opens up the original line of play while challenging club selection off the tee. The right side shifts slightly encouraging separation from holes 5 and 6. The green will be one of the most interesting with a large peninsula shaped back left corner protected by bunkers.



The green side bunkers will be reduced in size and the green enlarged towards the approach. This reintroduces interesting hole location and an inviting approach. The restored approach bunkers will be brought more into play requiring a well hit risk reward approach, or a perfectly placed lay-up.
